Bridget Anderson (UK)

Bridget Anderson is Professor of Migration and Citizenship and Research Director at COMPAS. She has a DPhil in Sociology and previous training in Philosophy and Modern Languages. She has explored the tension between labour market flexibilities and citizenship rights, and pioneered an understanding of the functions of immigration in key labour market sectors. She is the author of *Us and Them? The Dangerous Politics of Immigration Controls* (Oxford University Press, 2013) and *Doing the Dirty Work? The Global Politics of Domestic Labour* (Zed Books, 2000). She co-edited *Who Needs Migrant Workers? Labour Shortages, Immigration and Public Policy* with Martin Ruhs (Oxford University Press, 2010 and 2012), *The Social, Political and Historical Contours of Deportation* with Matthew Gibney and Emanuela Paoletti (Springer, 2013), and *Migration and Care Labour: Theory, Policy and Politics* with Isabel Shutes (Palgrave Macmillan, 2014). Bridget Anderson has worked closely with migrants' organisations, trades unions and legal practitioners at local, national and international level.

Jennifer Susan Chiriga (Zimbabwe)

A national of Zimbabwe, Jennifer Chiriga has over 30 years of accumulated work experience spread across government and the development arena. She has executive management experience and has worked extensively on civil society capacity-building strategies. Ms Chiriga has a broad spread of international experience. She was a fellow of the Africa-Asia Transitional Justice Fellowship Programme, an internationally recognised programme run jointly by the Institute for Justice and Reconciliation (IJR) in South Africa and the International Centre for Transitional Justice (ICTJ). She joined the African Union Commission in 2010 as a Program Expert in the Strategic Planning Department, and from June 2014 was appointed Deputy Chief of Staff in the Bureau of the Chairperson, later becoming Chief of Staff (April 2015 until March 2017), a leadership role focused on facilitating inter-departmental and inter-agency relationships, as well as being the focal point in coordinating interaction with AU Member States as well as the international community. Currently Advisor on Partnerships, to the CEO of NEPAD Agency in Johannesburg, South Africa.

Leticia Gutiérrez Valderrama (Mexico)

She is a missionary and human rights defender for migrants and refugees, winner of the National Prize for Human Rights, Sergio Mendez Arceo in 2017. She is currently Director of SMR, Scalabrinians: mission with Migrants and Refugees. She was Executive Secretary of Pastoral of Human Mobility at the Mexican Episcopal Conference 2007-2013. Her work began with women in the field of labor protection. Today, in conjunction with the Scalabrinian Mission for Migrants and Refugees SMR, she accompanies migrants and their human rights defenders, who for their solidarity with this vulnerable group have suffered different attacks. She holds a degree in International Commerce from the University of Guadalajara and in Social Philosophy with a specialization in Human Mobility from the Universidad Pontificia Urbaniana in Rome, Italy.

Carlos Martín Beristáin (Spain)

A medical doctor and holder of a doctorate in social psychology, he teaches on the European Masters in International Humanitarian Aid. He coordinated the *Guatemala. Nunca Más* report and has advised truth commissions in Peru, Paraguay and Ecuador. He has worked as a mental health adviser for International Peace Brigades in El Salvador, Guatemala and Colombia. For 25 years he has worked with victims of violence and war in various countries in conflict, with human rights groups and displaced and refugee communities, torture survivors and the relatives of the disappeared. He was the medical and psychosocial assessment expert in six cases before the Inter-American Court of Human Rights. In various cases he was a consultant to the International Criminal Court on working with victims. He is the author of many books on psychosocial work and care for the victims of human rights violations.

Bridget Anderson (Inglaterra)

Bridget Anderson es profesora de Migración y ciudadanía y Directora de investigación de COMPAS. Realizó un doctorado en sociología y su formación es en filosofía y lenguas modernas. Ha explorado la tensión entre la flexibilidad laboral y los derechos de ciudadanía, y ha promovido el avance en la comprensión de las funciones de los migrantes en los sectores del mercado laboral. Jennifer Chiriga tiene más de treinta años de experiencia a lo largo de gobiernos y en el tema del desarrollo. Tiene experiencia en la gestión de proyectos y en la construcción de estrategias de capacity building. Con larga experiencia internacional, ha sido miembro del Africa-Asia Transitional Justice Fellowship Programme, un programa internacional promovido por el Institute for Justice and Reconciliation in South Africa (IJR) y el International Centre for Transitional Justice (ICTJ). Ha participado en la African Union Commission en 2010 como Experta de programación en el Departamento de Planeación estratégica, y a partir de 2015 ha sido nombrada

Jefe de Personal del Departamento de la Presidencia, hasta Marzo de 2017, un rol de liderazgo y facilitación de las relaciones entre departamentos y agencias, así como de coordinación con los Estados Miembros de UA y de la comunidad internacinal. Actualmente es Advisor on Partnerships para el CEO (Chief Executive Office) de la Agencia NEPAD en Johannesburg.

Leticia Gutiérrez Valderrama (México)

Es misionera y defensora de derechos humanos de migrantes y refugiados, vencedora del Premio Nacional de Derechos Humanos don Sergio Mendez Arceo en 2017. Actualmente es directora de Vinculación de SMR., Scalabrinianas: misión con Migrantes y Refugiados. Ha sido Secretaria Ejecutiva de Pastoral de Movilidad Humana en la Conferencia Episcopal Mexicana de 2007-2013. Su trabajo inició con mujeres en materia de protección laboral. Hoy en día, en conjunto con las Scalabrinianas Misión para Migrantes y Refugiados SMR, acompaña a personas migrantes y a sus defensoras y defensores, quienes por apoyar de manera solidaria a este grupo vulnerable han sufrido diferentes atentados. Es Licenciada en Comercio Internacional por la Universidad de Guadalajara y en Filosofía Social con especialidad en Movilidad Humana en la Universidad Pontificia Urbaniana en Roma, Italia.

Carlos Martín Beristáin (España)

Médico y doctor en Psicología social. Profesor del Master Universitario Europeo en Ayuda Humanitaria Internacional. Ha sido coordinador del Informe *Guatemala. Nunca Más* y asesor de las Comisiones de la Verdad del Perú, Paraguay y Ecuador. Ha trabajado como asesor de salud mental de Brigadas Internacionales de Paz, en El Salvador, Guatemala y Colombia. Trabaja desde hace 25 años con víctimas de la violencia y la guerra en diferentes países en conflicto, con grupos de derechos humanos y comunidades desplazadas y refugiadas, con sobrevivientes de tortura y familiares de desaparecidos. Ha sido perito de evaluación médica y psicosocial en 6 casos ante la Corte Interamericana de Derechos Humanos. Ha sido Consultor de la Corte Penal Internacional en varios casos sobre trabajo con víctimas. Es autor de numerosos libros sobre el trabajo psicosocial y atención a las víctimas de violaciones de derechos humanos.
